

# De l'émergence du Phénix

From 25 November 2011 to 20 January 2012 Opening 24 November 6.30pm – 8pm, free

## Group exhibition with works by Rhona Byrne, Dorothy Cross, Mark Garry, Jaki Irvine, William McKeown & Dennis McNulty Curator: Caroline Hancock

A fantastical bird which rises back to life from the ashes of its own demise, the Phoenix conjures up notions of unreality, entrapment and freedom, regeneration and emergence. Within this open premise and the context of Ireland's economic crisis, six of the country's leading contemporary artists have been invited to show work at the Centre Culturel Irlandais. An ode to the generative power of artistic creation, the exhibition includes video, photography, painting, and sculptures. A dialogue emerges between the grand fictional firebird and familiar, more humble birds.

**Dorothy Cross** often works with animals she finds on the shore of Western Ireland where she lives. *Gannet* (2005), known as the albatross of the North, emerges in full flight from a pop-up screen. The merging of reality and projection presents wonder. *Three Finches* (2008) in bronze lie on their backs appearing wounded. On their breasts, the small folds of female genitalia suggest the reproductive potential of nature.

**Jaki Irvine** filmed *Guanajuato 14* (2010) at that address in Mexico City as the hummingbird flits between a mundane and symbolic space of life, fertility and joy, oblivious to, but embedded in, the working environment beyond. Time and space are in an in-between state, multiplied and overlapping.

**Mark Garry** recycles fallen sycamore leaves, patiently folding them into origami birds. Combining tradition and current awareness, his interests lie in haptic practices, in the repetitive and endlessly creative process of making pieces from ephemeral, simple materials. New forms appear and inhabit space.

Also modular, **Dennis McNulty**'s *flexible units/still* (2009) combines manufactured polypropylene tiles into an abstract vortex or thrust full of future potential. Pure plastic materiality is given movement and intention. Threedimensional geometric strategies open the possibility of an expanded engineering and architectural application. A sculpture becomes a structure. A structure becomes a sculpture.

Produced specifically for this exhibition, **Rhona Byrne**'s three photographs were taken in a crematorium in Dublin; they explore the materiality of the cremation process. *Narrating land, sky and sea* (2011) is a poignant visual essay on the capacity for transformation and potentiality. Both personal and universal in its poetry, this series refers to disappearance and resurgence.

**William McKeown**'s small abstract painting, *Starlings* (2008), shares the experience of a private moment: the sight of a fleeting passage of birds that also are certain to return. The pulsating central brushstrokes are a camaïeu of greys. A master of colour, space and light, known for his highly sensitive installations, William McKeown is also the author of the discrete tonal change in the gallery space.
